DECLARATION ON THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE REGIONAL INITIATIVE: LATIN AMERICA AND THE CARIBBEAN FREE OF CHILD LABOUR

Lima, October 14th 2014

We, the Ministers of Labour of the Nations of Argentina, Bahamas, the Plurinational State of Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Guyana, Haiti, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, the Dominican Republic, Suriname, Trinidad and Tobago, Uruguay and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, on the occasion of the Eighteenth American Regional Meeting of the ILO, held in Lima, Peru, from 13 to 16 October 2014;

- Recognising the progress made by the Latin America and the Caribbean region in the prevention i) and eradication of child labour and the protection of work permitted for adolescents, embodied, inter alia, in the wide ratification of the fundamental ILO Conventions No. 138 on the Minimum Age for Admission to Employment and No. 182 on the Elimination of the Worst Forms of Child Labour;
- Valuing the cumulative experience in defining and implementing a set of policies, plans and ii) programmes to deal with the situation of working children and adolescents, in the provision of specific services for them, their families and their communities, and in the promotion of increasing social awareness about the risks and consequences that child and adolescent labour entails for the development of our countries;
- Taking into account that, despite the progress made, the region shows a worrying stagnation in iii) the reduction of child labour, especially its worst forms, and that this requires an urgent, coordinated and integrated response within each country, among countries and blocks of countries in the continent in order to achieve the goals set to eliminate the worst forms of child labour by 2016 and all forms of child labour by 2020;
- iv) Considering that Goal 8, to "promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth and decent work for all," which includes an indicator for child labour elimination, particularly its worst forms, has been included in the new Millennium Development Goals for 2030;
- Considering that in the Brasilia Declaration, adopted in the framework of the III Global V) Conference on Child Labour (October 2013), the commitment was reiterated to eliminating the worst forms of child labour by 2016, with particular attention to gender-based approaches, education and social protection policies, among others;
- Considering the principles of the South-South cooperation, based on equality among peoples, vi) mutual support, local ownership and solidarity among nations;

HEREBY AGREE TO:

- Reaffirm that the persistence of child labour, especially its worst forms, is a factor that exacerbates social inequality, depriving millions of children and adolescents in our region of quality education and training necessary for their own development and the progress of their families, communities and nations, thus reinforcing inequality and social and economic vulnerability.
- Reiterate our political will and commitment to step up actions in line with the overall goal of eliminating the worst forms of child labour by 2016 and the regional goal of the Decent Work Hemispheric Agenda (2006-2015) to eliminate all forms of child labour by 2020. To this end, we will pursue policies to promote decent work based on the rights to economic and social development.
- Strengthen intergovernmental cooperation in the region through the creation of a Regional Initiative for a Latin America and Caribbean Free of Child Labour, comprised of high-level representatives of the governments of the region. This initiative has the mandate accelerate the pace in the prevention and eradication of child labour and its worst forms through institutional coordination within and among sectors and among the various levels of government, taking as examples the good practices developed in Latin America and the Caribbean and seeking that our countries will:
 - a) Have in place permanent and sustainable mechanisms for coordination of public, private and social actors in the prevention and eradication of child labour and hazardous adolescent labour and the protection of work permitted for adolescents;
 - b) Strengthen and integrate the groups that are vulnerable to child labour in their policies and programmes to combat poverty, inequality and exclusion, with a particular emphasis on indigenous peoples and communities;
 - c) Strengthen and incorporate the goal of prevention and eradication of child labour and hazardous adolescent labour and protection of work permitted for adolescents in the policies for employment formalisation;
 - d) Improve their ability to act locally to prevent and eliminate the worst forms of child labour;

- e) Strengthen the mechanisms for identifying, recording, follow-up, inspection, monitoring and control to ensure compliance with the regulations on the prohibition of child labour and the protection of work permitted for adolescents and guarantee children and adolescents the full exercise of their rights;
- f) Increase social awareness of the risks and hazards of child labour, especially its worst forms, for the present and future development of children and adolescents.
- g) Develop policies for the qualification and protection of the work permitted for adolescents above the minimum age for admission to employment that will help them to achieve a proper and successful transition from education into work.
- iv) Entrust the performance of the functions of the Technical Secretariat of the Regional Initiative to the International Labour Organisation, an institution which has provided ongoing support with the goal of combating child labour and has the expertise and knowledge necessary to accompany this effort by the countries;
- v) Call on our development partners at the regional and global levels, to join us in this new challenge to achieve a Latin America and the Caribbean Free of Child Labour, by providing technical and financial assistance to enable us to strengthen our capacities and enhance our responses to the problem.
- vi) Invite other countries that share our strong commitment to achieving the goals of child labour elimination by 2016 and 2020 to join in this collaborative effort.
